Rabeprazole Sodium Tablets 20 mg

Read all of this leaflet carefully before you start taking this medicine.

1 WHAT RABIUM IS AND WHAT IT IS USED FOR

Rabium tablet contains the active ingredient rabeprazole sodium. This belongs to a group of medicines called 'Proton Pump Inhibitors' (PPIs). They work by lowering the amount of acid that your stomach

- Rabium tablets are used to treat the following conditions:

 'Gastro-oesophageal reflux disease' (GORD), which can include heartburn. GORD is caused when acid and food from your stomach escapes into your food pipe (oesophagus)
- Ulcers in your stomach or the upper part of your gut (intestine). If these ulcers are infected with bacteria called 'Helicobacter pylori' (H. Pylori), you will also be given antibiotics. Using Rabium tablets and antibiotics together gets rid of the infection and makes the ulcer heal. It also stops the infection and ulcer from coming back Zollinger-Ellison Syndrome where your stomach produces too

2. BEFORE YOU TAKE RABIUM

- You are allergic (hypersensitive) to rabeprazole sodium, or any of the other ingredients of Rabium (listed in Section 6 below) You are pregnant or think that you are pregnant

 You are breast-feeding.

Do not use Rabium if any of the above applies to you. If you are not sure, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before using Rabiu

Children

Rabium should not be used in children.

Take special care with Rabium

Check with your doctor or pharmacist before taking Rabium if:

- · You are allergic to other proton pump inhibitor medicines or 'substituted benzimidazoles' Blood and liver problems have been seen in some patients but
- often get better when Rabium is stopped

 You have a stomach tumour
- You have ever had liver problems

 If you are taking atazanavir- for HIV infection
If you are not sure if any of the above applies to you, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before using Rabium.

If you experience severe (watery or bloody) diarrhoea with symptoms such as fever, abdominal pain or tenderness, stop taking Rabium and see a doctor straight away.

Please tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking or have recently taken any other medicines. This includes medicines obtained without a prescription, including herbal medicines.

In particular, tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking any of the following medicines:

Ketoconazole or itraconazole – used to treat infections caused by a

- fungus. Rabium may lower
- the amount of this type of medicine in your blood. Your doctor may need to adjust your dose.
- Atazanavir– used to treat HIV-infection, Rabium may lower the amount of this type of medicine in your blood and they should not be used together

If you are not sure if any of the above apply to you, talk to your doctor or pharmacist before using Rabium.

Pregnancy and breast-feeding

• Do not use Rabium if you are pregnant or think you may be pregnant

- Do not use Rabium if you are breast-feeding or planning to
- Ask your doctor or pharmacist for advice before taking any medicine during pregnancy or while breastfeeding.

Driving and using machines

You may feel sleepy while taking Rabium. If this happens, do not drive or use any tools or machines.

Always take Rabium exactly as your doctor has told you. You should check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure

Taking this medicine

- Only remove a tablet from the blister strip when it is time to take your medicine
- Swallow your tablets whole with a drink of water. Do not chew or
- Your doctor will tell you how many tablets to take and how long to take them for. This will depend on your condition

 If you are taking this medicine for a long time, your doctor will want
- to monitor you.

Adults and the Elderly

For 'gastro-oesophageal reflux disease' (GORD) Treatment of moderate to severe symptoms (symp

- The usual dose is one Rabium 10 mg tablet once a day for up to 4
- Take the tablet in the morning before eating
 If your condition returns after 4 weeks treatment, your doctor may tell you to take one Rabium
- 10 mg tablet as and when you require it.

Treatment of more severe symptoms (erosive or ulcerative

- The usual dose is one Rabium 20 mg tablet once a day for 4 to 8
- Take the tablet in the morning before eating

- Long-term treatment of symptoms (GORD maintenance)

 The usual dose is one Rabium 10 mg or 20 mg tablet once a day for as long as your doctor has told you
- Take the tablet in the morning before eating
 Your doctor will want to see you at regular intervals to check your symptoms and dosage.

For ulcers of the stomach (peptic ulcers)

- The usual dose is one Rabium 20 mg tablet once a day for 6 weeks
 Take the tablet in the morning before eating
- Your doctor may tell you to take Rabium for another 6 weeks if your

For ulcers of the intestine (duodenal ulcers)

- The usual dose is one Rabium 20 mg tablet once a day for 4 weeks
- Take the tablet in the morning before eating
- Your doctor may tell you to take Rabium for another 4 weeks if your condition does not improve.

For ulcers caused by H. Pylori infection and to stop them coming

- The usual dose is one Rabium 20 mg tablet twice a day for seven
- Your doctor will also tell you to take antibiotics called amoxicillin

and clarithromycin

- The usual dose is three Rabium 20 mg tablets once a day to start
- The dose may then be adjusted by your doctor depending on how you respond to the treatment.

If you are on long-term treatment you will need to see your doctor at regular intervals for review of your tablets and sympton

Children. The product should not to be used in children

Patients with liver problems. You should consult your doctor who will take special care when beginning treatment with Rabium and while you continue to be treated with Rabium.

If you take more Rabium than you should

f you take more Rabium than you should, talk to a doctor or go to a hospital straight away. Take the medicine pack with you

If you forget to take Rabium

- If you forget to take a dose, take it as soon as you remember it. However, if it is almost time for your next dose, skip the missed dose and continue as usual
- If you forget to take your medicine for more than 5 days, talk to your doctor before taking any more medicine

 Do not take a double dose (two doses at the same time) to make up

If you stop taking Rabium

Relief of symptoms will normally occur before the ulcer has completely healed. It is important that you do not stop taking the tablets until told to do so by your doctor.

4. POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS

Like all medicines, Rabium can cause side effects, although not everybody gets them.

The side effects are usually mild and improve without you having to stop taking this medicine.

Stop taking Rabium and see a doctor straight away if you notice

any of the following side effects -you may need urgent medical

- Allergic reactions the signs may include: sudden swelling of your face, difficulty breathing or low blood pressure which may cause fainting or collapse
- Frequent infections, such as a sore throat or high temperature (fever), or ulcers in your mouth or thr

Bruising or bleeding easily.
 These side effects are rare (affect less than 1 in 1,000 people).

 Severe skin blistering, or soreness or ulcers in your mouth and throat.

These side effects are very rare (affect fewer than 1 in 10, 000

Other possible side effects:

Common (affect less than 1 in 10 people)

- Difficulty sleeping
- Headache or feeling dizzy
 Cough runny nose or sore throat (pharyngitis)
- Effects on your stomach or gut such as stomach pain, diarrhoea wind (flatulence), feeling sick (nausea), being sick (vomiting) or constipation
- Aches or back pain
- Weakness or flu-like symptoms

Uncommon (affect less than 1 in 100 people)

- Feeling nervous or drowsy Chest infection (bronchitis)
- Painful and blocked sinuses (sinusitis) Dry mouth
- · Indigestion or belching
- · Muscle, leg or joint pain
- Bladder infection (urinary tract infection) Chest pain
- Chills or fever
- Changes in how your liver is working (shown in blood tests)

Rare (affect less than 1 in 1,000 people)

- Loss of appetite (Anorex
- Depression
- Hypersensitivity (includes allergic reactions)
 Visual disturbance
 Sore mouth (stomatitis) or taste disturbance
- Upset stomach or stomach pain
 Liver problems including yellowing of your skin and whites of your eves (iaundice)
- Itchy rash or blistering skin
- Sweating
- Kidney problemsWeight gain Changes in white blood cells (shown in blood tests) which may
- result in frequent infection.

 Reduction in blood platelets resulting in bleeding or bruising more easily than normal

Other possible side effects (unknown frequency)

- breast swelling in men
- Low blood levels of sodium which can cause tiredness and confusion0, muscle twitching, fits and coma.

 Patients who have previously had liver problems may very rarely
- get encephalopathy (a brain disease)"

Do not be concerned by this list of side effects. You may not get any of

them. If any of the side effects get serious, or if you notice any side effects not listed in this leaflet, please tell your doctor or pharmacist

Store below 25° C, protect from light and moisture. Keep out of the reach and sight of children.

Do not refrigerate.

Do not use Rabium after the expiry date which is stated on the carton and blister foil. The expiry date refers to the last day of that month.

Medicines should not be disposed of via wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to dispose of medicines that are no longer required. These

measures will help to protect the environment Swallow whole tablet. Do not crush or chew.
